Iraq: flirting with Russia?

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Russia announced that it would consider an Iraqi request for help against ISIS, which will expand the Russian influence in the region. Iraqi claims for Russian helps show the lack of advance in the fight against ISIS and internal political woes, which have placed the Prime Minister Abadi in a challenging position (Iraq: On the brink of a political crisis favoring ISIS). Abadi needs a rapid victory to counterbalance the Iranian proxies (Maliki) to extend their power. The motivation for Russia to engage with Iraq is multiple. From military obvious reasons (cruise missiles need to fly over Iraq to hit Syria), to enhance their influence in the region for strategic discussions.

The Iraqi dilemma

Russia. Svria. Iraq and Iran agreed to open an intelligence coordination center in Baghdad and Russia to deal with ISIS. Within the agreement, the US would not access to the intelligence that Iraq can share with Russia. In response, the US Deputy Secretary of Defense commented that the US would not share information with Iraq, which could also benefit Russia, Iran and Syria. The risks of this lack of coordination will be twofold. First, the risk of mistrust between Washington and Baghdad and the clashing interests may favor ISIS. Second, given the increasing military traffic in the area, the risk of a "military accident" could be non-negligible and it would aggravate the crisis.

The actual Iraqi PM Abadi stated that Russia will be welcomed if they come to Iraqi territory to fight ISIS, but only if they ioin the International Coalition. Within this framework, the PM Abadi will try solve their external and internal dilemma. In one hand, they would not choose Russia as a substitute of the US as the partner, as the Russian support could lead to an increase of the Iranian

influence. However, Abadi might try to attract the Russians to fight ISIS as he needs a more solid fight to ISIS to temper internal criticism and the opposition of Maliki supporters. At the end, it will be Russia or the US the ones which push Iraq to be clear on its strategic position. In this sense, financial assistance by the US to cover the fragile Iraqi situation has been recently negotiated.

Kurdish leader Barzani also welcomed Russian possible support to Kurdish cause against ISIS. It is a sign of Kurds' eagerness to end the war in the north. However. the political crisis in the Kurdish Regional Government (KRG) between Barzani's KDP and Gorran could limit any Russian support to Iraqi Kurds.

The motivation behind Russian aspirations in Iraq

There are three possible reasons why Russia could intervene in the war in Iraq:

- First, Russia could gain a strategic leverage in its fight in Syria: Russian ships located in Caspian Sea fired 26 cruise missiles to ISIS targets in Syria. Cruise missiles fly horizontally like a plane therefore the transiting countries coordination is needed. In this case. Russian cruise missiles passed through Iranian and Irani territories. Increasing cooperation between Moscow and Baghdad could increase Russian offensive in eastern Syria.
- Second, its influence in Iraq could help Russia to solidify its future role on strategic decisions of the Middle East. With an increasing presence in Svria and Irag, the Gulf countries may need Russian assistance in their relations with these countries. A recent Saudi Arabia-Russia talk on Syria proves that. Therefore, under its umbrella it would be easier for Russia to influence the future of the Middle East.
- Third. Russia could combine Iran. Iraq and Svria as an energy hub: although the war in Iraq and Svria would last long and it cannot be ruled out. if Russia can be successful in defeating ISIS in Iraq and securing a regime loyal to Kremlin in Syria, it could sponsor an Iranian gas pipeline project passing through Iraq and Syria. Such a project would make Syria a vital territory for energy security and Russia would gain an upper hand in preserving its presence in the Middle East. However, it could contain Turkey's importance as an energy hub.



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
