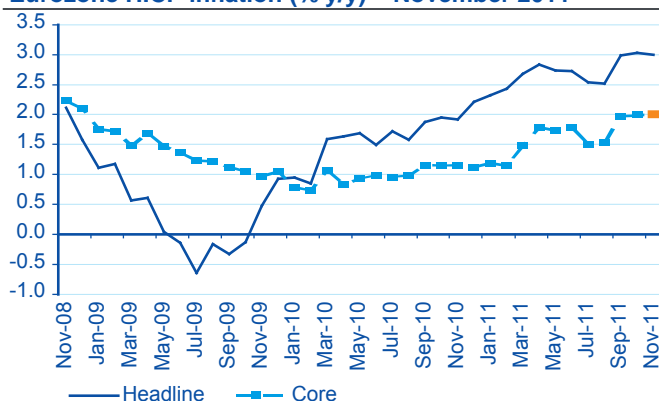
Eurozone: Inflation unchanged in November, while incoming data continue to point to negative growth in Q4

HICP inflation for November and unemployment rate for October

Eurozone inflation remained stable in November, as expected, for the third month in a row and has probably reached its peak. Inflation will slow in December, and fall to below 2% in the first quarter of 2012. On the labour market, Eurostat confirmed that unemployment rate increased further in October, continuing the upward trend since Q2. Earlier this week, monetary aggregates showed that loans to households declined in October, while the EC survey revealed that economic sentiment resumed its decline in November, as expected. Overall, our model for short-run GDP growth confirms that Eurozone activity could contract in Q4 (-0.1% q/q).

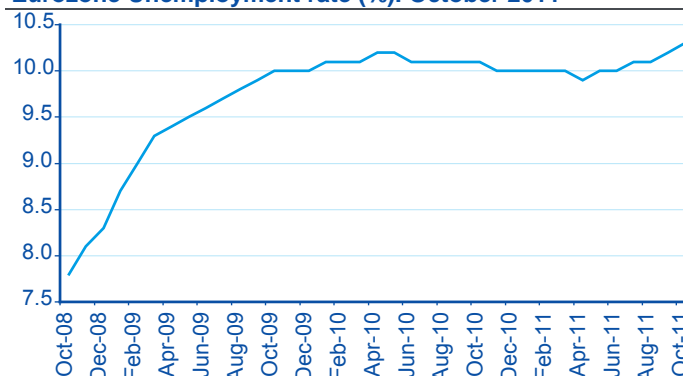
- HICP inflation remained unchanged in November,**
 at 3% y/y, as expected (BBVA Research and Consensus: 3.0% y/y). Although the detailed breakdown is not available yet, our forecasts suggest that both headline and core inflation should have remained unchanged in November for the third month in a row, after the acceleration observed in September, thus suggesting that inflation has already peaked. Recently, uncertainty about inflation has increased, due to methodological changes combined with tax hikes. Nevertheless, we continue to see a slowdown in inflation in December, to fall below the ECB target late in the first quarter of 2012. Regarding core inflation, we expect it to hover around current rates for the remainder of the year, moderating somewhat afterwards.
- Unemployment rate increased by 0.1pp to 10.3% in October,**
 (BBVA Research: 10.3% and Consensus: 10.2%), after raising also in September. This, combined with last month revisions for the whole year, shows that the unemployment rate increased by around 0.4pp since April. Recent data suggest that the mild recession in Q4 along with higher uncertainty about coming quarters are weighing on firms' hiring intentions, which are worsening further according to the EC survey. All these figures show further evidence of deterioration in the labour market in the short-term. Across large countries, the unemployment rate in Italy and Spain increased further, while it remained stable in France. In contrast, the unemployment rate in Germany declined again in October, continuing the downward pace observed since mid-2010 and remaining below those rates observed after the crisis..
